Inga Manskopf has coordinated the Prevention WINS coalition since 2006, first as an employee of Seattle Public Schools and, since 2010, as an employee of Seattle Children's Hospital's Division of Adolescent Medicine. With the mission of preventing youth substance abuse in NE Seattle, Prevention WINS (www.PreventionWorksInSeattle.org) was established in 2006 to address high underage drinking rates in the community. Between 2006-2010, underage drinking rates among NE Seattle 10th grade students were cut in half at one high school and dropped by 13 percentage points in the other.

As Prevention WINS Coordinator, Ms. Manskopf organizes and leads a diverse group of community stakeholders in developing, implementing, and evaluating substance abuse prevention strategies. These strategies are both "individual programs" such as curricula targeting middle school youth and families and "environmental strategies" such as media advocacy, social marketing campaigns, and legislative advocacy.

Ms. Manskopf is the Secretary for the Washington Association for Substance Abuse & Violence Prevention (www.WASAVP.org) and was awarded a 2008 Citizen Appreciation Award from Seattle Police Department.
