## PURPOSE/BACKGROUND

Effective March 18, 2020, <u>House Bill 2551</u> affirms inherent rights assured through tribal sovereignty and expressly provides that school districts must allow American Indian and Alaska Native K–12 and higher education students who are members of federally recognized tribes to wear traditional tribal regalia and objects of cultural significance at graduation ceremonies and related events. In addition, school districts and higher education institutions are required, when necessary, to update relevant policies or procedures in accordance with this law.

School district system leaders and staff are encouraged to promptly consult with tribal nations and collaborate with Native American parent advisory committees and Native American education leaders to develop policies, procedures, and practices associated with the law. It is critical that districts work in a timely manner to resolve any potential issues regarding cultural inclusivity prior to commencement. BULLETIN NO. 045-20 SP&FA June 26, 2020 Page 2
