## How to Use Tableau

This Tableau tool allows you to view the different questions that were on the <u>COVID-19</u> <u>Student Survey</u>, by topic and by these different demographic groups:

- Disability
- Gender Identity
- Grade Level
- Race and Ethnicity
- Seasonal aka Migrant Working Family Status
- Sexual Orientation

\*\*\* At the State and ESD levels each cell must have an N (number of students who answered the question) of at least 10. If one cell does not, it is suppressed along with the next lowest cell because the denominator is shown as well. This prevents people from potentially being able to "work backwards" to identify specific student's answers. At the county level in order to get results, there needs to be at least three schools with valid responses and then the above suppression rules apply as well.

A reminder that the decision to participate in this survey was left up to each school. All students in eligible grades were invited to participate, but that does not mean that every student did. Therefore, **this is a convenience sample and is not intended to be generalizable to the state population. Results represent only the students who took the survey.** 

When talking about the results it is most appropriate to say things like;

- "Of the students who took the survey" or
- "Students who completed the survey said..."
