Native Education in Washington State

The Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) has supported the education of Native students in Washington since the mid-1960s.

- In 2011, the Legislature formalized the Office of Native Education (ONE) within OSPI (Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 28A.300.105).
- 1989 Centennial Accord and <u>RCW 43.376</u> describe government-to-government relations.
- Facilitating the development and implementation of curricula and instructional materials in Native languages, culture and history, and the concept of tribal sovereignty, pursuant to <u>RCW 28A.320.170</u>.
- Teaching Washington's Tribal History, Culture, and Government in Teacher Preparation Programs: <u>RCW 28B.10.710</u> and Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 181-78A-232 (subsection 5).
- Coordinating the implementation of State-Tribal Education Compact schools pursuant to <u>RCW 28A.715.010</u> and <u>WAC Chapter</u> 392-800
- Students' Right to Wear Tribal Regalia at School Events (<u>House Bill (HB) 2551 (2019-2020</u>). In addition, school districts and institutions of higher education are required, when necessary, to update relevant policies or procedures in accordance with this law.
