# OSPI Child Nutrition Programs Reference Sheet

# **Area Eligibility in Child Nutrition Programs**

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) funded Child Nutrition Programs use two primary sources of data to determine whether a site is area eligible – school data or census data. Established area eligibility is effective for a period of five consecutive participation years.

## Area Eligibility based on School Data

- CACFP <u>At-Risk Afterschool Meal</u> programs and <u>NSLP Afterschool Snack</u> programs must use school
  data to determine area eligibility. The prior year's October Building Data is used.
- School data may be used to establish area eligibility for open sites sponsoring the <u>SFSP</u> or <u>SSO</u>.
   Current year October data is used.
- School data must indicate that the proposed meal **site** is located in the attendance area of a public school where at least 50% of the children are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
  - o OSPI Child Nutrition Services posts the <u>Washington Public School Data for Area Eligibility</u> Report annually.
- Schools that draw students from throughout the district may not be used, for example:
  - o Alternative high schools or skill centers may not be used to qualify sites as area eligible.
- Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) schools use their Free Claiming Percentage (Identified Student Percentage (ISP) multiplied by 1.6) to determine area eligibility. CEP schools are included in the <a href="Washington Public School Data for Area Eligibility Report">Washington Public School Data for Area Eligibility Report</a> (the data for these schools has been adjusted so that no further calculations are needed.)\*
  - CEP schools must use October data from the year prior to CEP implementation in the first year of CEP for area eligibility determinations.
  - If the school applied for CEP in a group or district-wide, the individual school's free claiming percentage is used for area eligibility, not the group's.
- Area Eligibility may be used for 5 years or be updated annually.

## Area Eligibility based on Census Data

- Census data may be used to establish area eligibility for open sites sponsoring the <u>SFSP</u> or <u>SSO</u>.
- Census data may be used to establish Tier 1 eligibility for CACFP Family Day Care Home providers.
- Census data must indicate that the proposed meal site is located in a Census Block Group or Census Tract in which at least 50 percent or more of the children are eligible for free or reducedprice school meals.



• The <u>FNS Area Eligibility Mapper</u> identifies if a specific location qualifies as area eligible, using the address of the potential meal site. The mapper is updated annually in October.

#### SFSP Special Situations:

- Use of Other Approved Data Sources in SFSP:
  - Other approved sources may demonstrate that 50 percent or more of the children in a defined area are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals.
  - Approved sources: Department of Welfare, Zoning Commissions, USDA Rural
     Development Housing Authorities, Housing and Urban Development Housing Authorities,
     and Local Housing Authorities.
- SFSP and SSO sites serving children of migrant workers:
  - Area eligibility may be established upon a determination that a meal site predominantly serves the children of migrant workers.
  - Sponsors must submit information obtained from a migrant organization that certifies that the site serves the children of migrant workers.
- SFSP and SSO sites serving American Indian or Alaskan Native Children:
  - Area eligibility may be established for sites that are located in areas in which poor economic conditions exist.
  - Defined as a geographic area where at least 50 percent of the children enrolled at the site are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
  - Sponsors must provide documentation from a Tribal authority that certifies that the proposed site is located on a Tribal reservation, on trust land, or in an Alaska Native village where at least 50 percent of the children enrolled at the sire are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
