





MEP Behavioral Health Grant 2023-2024

DESCRIPTION:

The Washington Migrant Education Program (MEP) is making federal funds available to participating school districts to help migratory children benefit from the introduction or expansion of high-quality behavioral health programs and services. The introduction or expansion of behavioral health programs and services must:

- Address specific behavioral health needs of local educational agencies' migratory eligible students; and
- 2. Be supplemental to existing local, state, federal, or other resources:
- In alignment with the MEP State Service Delivery Plan activities and services.

Funds will be available in five different block grant opportunities depending on the level of need, migratory student count, and program(s)/services proposed.

ELIGIBILITY:

Eligible Applicants: Existing or new local school districts accepting a Title I, Part C. Migrant Education Regular Grant

Additional Information on Eligibility: Participating Title I, Part C school districts with carryover less than \$450,000.00

Priority:

Priority will be given to districts based on the following criteria:



Behavioral Health Grant Opportunity

For Example:

PAC is recommending funding a soccer club due to lack of physical activity.

- Proposed Activities- Is this an <u>identified behavioral</u> health need?
 - No, the proposal noted that this activity was suggested due to physical activity,
 - How was the specific behavioral health need identified? PAC made the recommendation.
 - What tool did you use? A survey have been conducted but this need is not specific to behavioral health.
 - Is the activity addressing a behavioral health need directly or tangentially? No, the need identified is specific to lack of physical activity.
 - Is the activity targeted to needs students? No, no evidence of how youth with specific behavioral health needs are recruited or if this activity specifically meet their needs.



Behavioral Health Grant Opportunity

Applications will be evaluated by partner ESDs and OSPI. For a successful application, consider the following:

Quality vs Quantity:

- # of proposed activities- can be they implemented and managed effectively?
 - More is not always better, consider consolidating for a targeted intervention
- PAC Consultation- did you submit evidence of consultation? (not just summary)
 - Agendas, pictures, notes, follow-up meetings, etc.

- Additionally, migratory students who wish to participate in this program must meet these requirements:
 - ✓ A 3.2 or higher GPA OR demonstrate the ability to be academically successful.
 - ✓ Taken at least one (1) advance course in biology, chemistry, math, etc.
 - ✓ Plan to pursue a post-secondary education.
 - ✓ Demonstrated interest in pursuing a career in the health sciences.


