Reviewer 350

This short, animated video explains the difference between sex, gender, and gender identity in age-appropriate ways. The characters represent a range of people of color. The main character, a young person, presumably middle school-ish age, does the explaining. Sex and gender are defined using the terms penis and vulva describing a person's sex. The video stops short of using the term transgender, but describes the lived experience of those whose bodies (sex) may not align with their identities. Gender stereotypes are addressed thoughtfully, including pointing out the influences of marketing on gendered toys/items. There is not a lesson plan, nor is there a teacher guide or assessment tool provided. Ideally, a teacher guide of some sort would accompany this video, as teachers would want to pre-teach prior to viewing, and may benefit from having some follow up questions or activity to accompany this.

Strengths: concise and direct; uses easy-to-understand language and simple visuals to help explain what the difference between gender and sex are. While the video doesn't shy away from language like "penis" and "vulva", all the visuals are appropriate for all ages. (no genitalia shown.)

Shortcomings: doesn't use terminology associated with the topic, like "transgender" or "cisgender". The video is unbiased, perhaps to a fault, because it doesn't acknowledge the transphobic biases that exist in society at large, instead acting as if everyone agrees that gender

and sex are not the same. Feels more appropriate for the younger end of the age bracket.

Reviewer 355

This is a 2.5 minute long animated introductory video on the concepts of sex and gender. The video is engaging, has racially diverse characters, and has the option to turn on closed captioning. The video is suitable for grades 6-8. Although this video is discussing sex and gender, the video reinforces the gender binary. There does not seem to be any representation of gender non-conforming or transgender individuals, or people who fit outside the gender binary, despite the topic. The video mentions that "there are a whole bunch of possibilities" when it comes to gender, but otherwise exclusively uses binary gendered language and imagery. The video reduces sex to penises and vulvas, but does mention that "sometimes it's more complicated". Although it mentions that sex is more complicated than external genitals, this over simplification may alienate intersex students. The video describes gender as something felt on the inside, implying that an individual has an inside and outside gender and that our genitals are inherently gendered. This language may not resonate with gender non-conforming and transgender students. If this video is utilized to teach about sex and gender, it should be paired with additional resources and instruction.

Reviewer 357

The Gender Explained resource is a free video supplement produced by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. This resource is about 2.5 minutes long and primarily takes the following prospective on gender:

- A person's body parts may or may not match how that person feels on the inside.
- There are a "whole bunch of possibilities" when it comes to gender.
- Figuring out what feels right for you regarding gender is a part of growing up.

A secondary theme in this video is that toys, clothes, and games are genderless with no "girl things" or "boy things". Rather these constructs are categories made up primarily by retailers. Educators may see strengths in this video as it portrays a variety of characters including members of protected classes. This video is also visually engaging and sprinkles in a bit of humor.

This video provides a very clear and basic distinction between gender and sex. The information is accurate and uses the latest science-based findings. Facts are presented without bias or judgement. The video is easy to understand and age-appropriate. The dialogue helps to reinforce the concept of the difference between gender and sex. The video concludes with some humor and keeps the content factual but light.
