

Continuous Improvement Tutorial: SMARTIE Goals

Overview of the Importance of SMARTIE Goals

Writing SMARTIE goals (Specific, Measurable, Actionable/Achievable, Relevant, Time-bound, Inclusive, Equitable) is crucial for crafting effective and impactful School Improvement Plans (SIPs). These goals help ensure that educational initiatives are clear, measurable, and designed with equity in mind, which is vital for improving outcomes for all students and closing opportunity gaps. By incorporating inclusion and equity, SMARTIE goals address the needs of historically underserved students, promoting fairness and justice throughout the educational process.

Involving Community and Staff Members

Creating meaningful SMARTIE goals requires the involvement of both community and staff members. Engaging these stakeholders ensures that the goals reflect diverse perspectives and meet the specific needs of the school community. Here's how to effectively involve them:

- **Convene a Diverse Team:** Assemble a group with varied experiences, including teachers, administrators, parents, students, and community leaders. This diversity ensures a balanced perspective on the goals.
- **Seek Input and Feedback:** Before finalizing the goals, gather feedback from those directly impacted, particularly students and parents from underserved communities. This ensures the goals are inclusive and equitable.
- **Clarify Decision-Making Processes:** Establish a clear process for decision-making, whether by consensus, majority vote, or another method. Ensure all voices are heard in this process.



Seven-Step Process for Creating SMARTIE Goals

<p>1. Conduct a Data Review/Comprehensive Needs Assessment (Specific)</p> <p>Begin by conducting a data review and/or thorough needs assessment to identify the specific challenges and opportunities within your school. <p>2. Define Specific Objectives (Measurable)</p> <p>Clearly articulate what you aim to achieve with specific, measurable objectives. Ensure Goals Are Actionable and Achievable (Actionable/Achievable)</p> <p>Develop a realistic action plan to achieve the goals, considering the resources available, such as time, staff, and funding.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <input type="checkbox"/> Outline Action Steps: Break down the goal into actionable steps. <input type="checkbox"/> Assign Responsibilities: Clearly define who is responsible for each action. <input type="checkbox"/> Consider Resources: Ensure that the goals are realistic given the available resources. 	<p>Student Growth</p>
<p>4. Align Goals with School Mission (Relevant)</p> <p>Ensure that the goals are aligned with the overall mission and priorities of the school. <p>5. <p>6. Incorporate Inclusivity (Inclusive) Ensure that the goals include and benefit all members of the school community, particularly those who are traditionally marginalized. <p>7. Embed Equity in the Goals (Equitable) Design goals that actively work to reduce disparities and promote equity within the school. Office of System and School Improvement (OSSI) Supports for Schools

- **Continuous Improvement Partners (CIPs):** systems support and technical assistance from our contracted team of executive-level educational experts working throughout the state with eligible LEA and school leadership and planning teams.
- **Resources and Professional Development:** evidence-based resources and

training opportunities focused on promising practices for school improvement, data support and implementation, improvement science, bridging achievement gaps, and improving outcomes for each and every student.
