## Career and Technical Student Organizations



Washington state has eight recognized Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs) that have a definite impact on student's overall college and career readiness. CTSOs provide relevant, engaging programs that improve student achievement, reduce dropout rates, and help students discover the wide range of career options available. CTSOs engage the community and local businesses to help students understand global competition, develop 21st century skills focused on creativity, problem solving, teamwork, goal setting, and chart effective and efficient pathways through high school and postsecondary education for their personal success. Students who participate in CTSOs demonstrate higher levels of academic engagement and motivation, civic engagement, career self-efficacy and employability skills than other students.

#### **Washington DECA**

DECA was founded in 1943 and prepares emerging leaders and entrepreneurs in marketing, finance, hospitality, and management. Washington DECA is the fifth largest DECA association in the world, with over 12,000 members in 164 high schools and skill centers. DECA provides experiential, career connected learning opportunities. By creating partnerships between business and education, Washington DECA maximizes real-world experiences to develop students into leaders and entrepreneurs.

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#### **Washington FFA Association**

The National FFA Organization was founded in 1928 and the Washington FFA Association was chartered in 1930. 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


#### Washington Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA)

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#### **SkillsUSA Washington**



SkillsUSA Washington is a state and national membership association serving high school, college, and middle school students who are preparing for careers in trade, technical, and skilled service occupations, including health occupations. The organization is a partnership of students, teachers, and industry working together to ensure America has a skilled workforce. SkillsUSA serves more than 331,000 students and instructors annually.
