Continuous Improvement Webinar Series How to Use the LEA-Consolidated Plan (L-CAP)

The Local Education Agency Consolidated Accountability Plan (L-CAP) helps school districts create a clear plan to support student success. It is required under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) for districts with schools needing extra help. The L-CAP identifies resource gaps, such as funding, staffing, and access to programs, so all students get the support they need. It also connects district-wide goals with School Improvement Plans (SIPs) to create a strong plan for learning. By working with school leaders, families, and tribal communities, the L-CAP makes sure everyone has a voice in the process. It also tracks progress so schools can adjust their strategies and improve student outcomes.

Six-Step Checklist for Completing the L-CAP

Step 1: Gather Required Information

- ☐ Identify your schools needing support using Washington School Improvement Framework (WSIF) data.
- ☐ Complete a Comprehensive Needs Assessment (<u>CNA</u>) to evaluate student and system-level strengths, root causes, and improvement priorities.
- ☐ Collect data on resource inequities, including budgeting, staffing, and access to specialized programs.

Step 2: Develop School Improvement Plans (SIPs)

- □ Support each identified school in creating a School Improvement Plan (SIP) based on CNA findings.
- ☐ Ensure SIPs include SMARTIE goals, evidence-based interventions, and progress monitoring plans.
- ☐ Align SIPs with district-wide strategic priorities and improvement efforts.

Step 3: Draft the L-CAP

- ☐ Use the online <u>L-CAP template</u> to draft the plan.
- ☐ Ensure alignment with district-wide improvement strategies and school SIPs.
- ☐ Address important sections, including school leader collaboration, community feedback, tribal consultation, and resource equity.



Step 4: Identify and Implement Evidence-Based Interventions (EBIs) Select at least two EBIs per goal from What Works Clearinghouse, OSPI Learning Assistance Program, or DOE-approved strategies. Outline how these interventions will support SIP goals and improve student outcomes. Define data sources for measuring effectiveness and tracking student progress. Step 5: Establish Progress Monitoring Set up data collection and analysis procedures to track SIP implementation. Ensure ongoing collaboration with school leaders, families, and tribal communities. Adjust interventions based on data insights and feedback. Step 6: Submit and Maintain Compliance Submit the completed L-CAP via the online system. Retain records for federal and state compliance reviews. Engage in continuous monitoring and updates to improve student outcomes.

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
