

- Strawberries are usually the first commercial berry to start ripening in Washington State.
- Strawberries are not true berries, but an accessory fruit in the rose family.
- There are more than 600 unique varieties of strawberries in varying shapes, sizes, and flavors.
- Strawberries are grown in many areas of Washington, but most are produced in Skagit and Whatcom Counties.
- Washington State has been growing strawberries commercially since the 1830s.
- Americans eat on average 5 lbs. of strawberries each year.

Sidhu Farms - Puyallup, WA
Sidhu Farms was stablished in 1997 by Chet
Sidhu who moved to the US from India. The
farm started with growing blueberries and
selling at Pike Place Market. The farm uses
organic growing methods and irrigation
from the glacier-fed, nutrient dense Puyallup
river to grow blueberries, raspberries,
blackberries, and strawberries.
