Advisory members' role

Notes from Breakout Discussion:

- Sandy G: Become clear what an ecosystem is represented in this group. We all have a
 huge stake in this but we don't have a system for harassing our influence and
 expertise to make system changes. Really important that we keep in mind the asks
 we put on school districts, especially smaller districts and those with less resources.
- Mandy P.: Striking about how much power we had represented in the breakout across the system continuum.
- Ekkarath S.: Thinking about disaggregated data. Who are the students most represented in the data on needs? What are their parents' socio-economic status? Life circumstances, etc? Important that we consider the circumstances in which parents and families make decisions about school and school participation.
 Sometimes attending school isn't the best decision at a given time for a family.

Ground with data

- Minor changes over the last 6-7 years
- Significant change between 2008-09 & 2023-24

Questions & Discussion:

- Kim S.: How does the graduation data reflect students that disengaged from school during the pandemic and never returned?
 - OSPI data considers students in a cohort based on incoming 9th grade classes. Graduation rates reflect % of students that entered in a 9th grade cohort who graduated in 4 years. OSPI also tracks 5 year graduation rates.

Breakout Session Notes:

- Ella Sharrett: We talked about funding, and what will require a lot of money and what we can do to adjust the recommendations to require less funding. Melissa Beard: Community efforts outside of the school need to be a relationship between the school and community, and the efforts need to be on both parties, not just the schools' responsibility.
- Chris Simonsmeier: I do think it's a shared responsibility. Schools already have a large laundry list of things to do, so making the time and effort for students with more needs is a lot.
- Krissy: The statute was written years ago, and it was helpful for me to go back and look at it. Graduation is not just a k12 issue.
- Kim Sanchez: Pillar one is promising. There was a concern that the capacity of behavioral health navigators. Pillar 5 concerns, we want to see support for children under 16 years old, but there is not a lot available. Online school ends up being the default, but this may not be the best option for every child. Pillar 3, representatives would need to be fully funded, and smaller districts may not have the funding for that. What are some small wins that don't cost a lot? Pillar 6, policy changes. What is the capacity of school districts and how can we wrap ourselves around all the complexity that we are asked to handle.
- Alexi Castilla: Pillar 6, do youth and families understand this process or understand
 the intent behind it? It can be viewed as a negative thing even though that is not
 what the intent behind it is. We also talked about the responsibility of schools
 versus what they can provide. There is a misunderstanding of what communities
 expect schools to handle and what they can actually provide. We should focus on
 prevention, and you can do that by starting in kindergarten. We are missing that
 engagement from the beginning and an understanding of what parents and

students can get from their schools. We talked about setting expectations and supporting families in crisis. Why should families engage in schools? Why is education valuable?
