Glossary of Acronyms and Key Definitions

- **LEA**–Local Educational Agency.
- **McKinney-Vento Act**—A federal law giving PreK-12 students experiencing homelessness the right to important educational services to remove barriers to education by providing immediate enrollment and access to educational services, including transportation to and from school/extracurricular activities, service referrals, and more.
- **McKinney-Vento Liaison**—Assigned by the school district superintendent to implement the McKinney-Vento Act by completing ten required duties, or provisions, of the law.
- NAEHCY-National Association for the Education of Homeless Children and Youth.
- NCHE-National Center for Homeless Education.
- **OSPI**–Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction–Washington's State Educational Agency .
- **Provisions**–Requirements of the law.
- **SEA**–State Educational Agency.
- **SEL**–Social-Emotional Learning–A process through which individuals build awareness and skills in managing emotions, setting goals, establishing relationships, and making responsible decisions that support success in school and in life–OSPI–SEL.
- **SHC**–SchoolHouse Connection–A national non-profit organization working to overcome homelessness through early care and education.
- **STEC**–State Tribal Education Compact Schools–Included as school districts or LEAs in this presentation.
- **Trauma-Informed**–A trauma-informed child and family service system responds to the impact of traumatic stress on children, caregivers, and service providers–OSPI–Trauma-Informed SEL.
- **UHY**–Unaccompanied Homeless Youth–Youth who qualify as both Unaccompanied and as meeting the definition of homeless under the McKinney-Vento Act. Applies to any age of student eligible for educational supports under McKinney-Vento.

Slide 9: 10 Liaison Duties

10 Liaison Duties

- i. Identify homeless children and youth through outreach and coordination.
- ii. Enroll and offer them a full and equal opportunity to succeed in that local LEA.
- iii. Homeless children and youth have access to and receive educational services.
- iv. Homeless children and youth receive referrals to health care, dental, other services.
- v. Inform parents and guardians and provide them with opportunities to participate.
- vi. Provide public notice.
- vii. Mediate disputes.
- viii. Provide transportation services.
- ix. Complete professional development.

x. Support unaccompanied youth.

Slide 10: Defining "Unaccompanies Homeless Youth"

Defining "Unaccompanied Homeless Youth"

- "An Unaccompanied Youth (UY) is a child or youth not in the physical custody of (not living with) a parent or guardian."
 42 U.S.C. 11434(a)(6)
- To qualify for services through McKinney-Vento, the youth must also meet the definition of homelessness.

Slide 13: Transportation Review

Transportation Review

- LEAs must provide students experiencing homelessness with transportation to and from their school of origin, at a parent or quardian's request.
- For an unaccompanied youth experiencing homelessness, the request would come from the LEA's McKinney-Vento liaison.









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Slide 14: Transportation for Extracurricular Activities

Transportation for Extracurricular Activities

- LEAs must provide or arrange transportation to and from extracurricular activities if a lack of transportation would be a barrier to "participating fully in school activities."
- This transportation may be arranged by the district, or by a program other than student transportation.















Slide 15: Transportation Considerations

Transportation Considerations

- Provide **sensitivity training** to bus drivers and any transportation staff or contractors.
- Arrange bus stops to keep student living situations confidential.
- **Build close ties** between school district homeless liaisons, school staff, and student transportation staff.



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Slide 16: Transportation Funding Considerations

Transportation Funding Considerations

- Negotiate <u>Transportation Agreements</u> now.
- If student's school is outside their current school district:
 - The two districts involved must work together to apportion the cost and responsibility of the service.
 - If they cannot agree, the two districts are to split the cost equally.

Scenario #5:



Noah:

- A student entering school for the first time (Kindergarten) has older siblings that attend a school in the district.
- They all live out of district but are qualified as McKinney-Vento eligible.

Questions:

- Does Noah have a right to enroll in the district where the older siblings attend?
- Why or why not?
- Would Noah have access to transportation support through McKinney-Vento?

The Rose Family:

- A family experiencing homelessness.
- Has a daycare out of district.

- Are districts required to provide transportation to daycare in this scenario?

Elijah:

- The mother and father of a student are divorced.
- The father is experiencing homelessness, but the mother is housed.
- The student spends time with both.

Scenario #8



Lyle:

- Fourth-grade student at City Elementary School.
- Mom moving out of town during surgery rehabilitation.
- Requests a McKinney-Vento designation to assist with district transportation while staying with family friends outside of the district boundary.



Questions:

- What questions should the liaison ask the mom before determining whether Lyle is experiencing homelessness under the Act?
- Is Lyle experiencing homelessness or not?
- What led you to your answer?
- What do you believe is in Lyle's best interest?
- What services and support(s) can the district provide?
- What are the responsibilities of the neighboring district, if any?
