"PII: Should I Share?" is a short, important lesson to help students practice media literacy and decision-making regarding online data sharing practices. The video is engaging and a good way to get students thinking about commonly asked personal information questions



that they will encounter online. The lesson invites students to reflect upon their personal and familial values when deciding how to proceed in the case that they are unsure what information is okay to provide. It would be great to follow this short lesson with more practice in the classroom, perhaps using examples that students bring up themselves (like their most commonly used websites, school sites, etc.). There are additional lessons to follow this one, provided by Common Sense Media, which are great supplements to this lesson.

This lesson on Personally Identifiable Information (PII) is clear, engaging, and important content for students in Grade 6. The materials include clear teacher instructions, student handouts, and a PowerPoint for classroom use. The materials could easily be taught online or in-person and use language that is general and inclusive of all people. It invites participants to practice decision-making skills, assess personal values, and potentially discuss the content with their families after the lesson (therefore incorporating safety within their family as well). I would highly recommend this lesson for media literacy and digital safety.
