Reviewer Comments:

Reviewer 201

This is a supplemental offering of four, 45-minute sessions for high school students, about the sex trade and culture that enables it. Students examine the behaviors and beliefs that create power inequalities. For the sake of honesty and safety to speak, students are separated into male and non-male groups for this training. The scenarios and examples do not include people with various gender identities, sexual orientations nor disability status. That notwithstanding, the content is so powerful, and the pedagogy directed toward attitudes and actions, that I highly recommend it. The scenarios and examples can be modified by an appropriately aware teacher.

I was unable to locate/review any support materials or resource references. While the content & delivery will have an impact, like all prevention training, it requires reinforcement through word, modeling and environment over time.

Reviewer 207

This curriculum is well organized and easy to follow. There are ample activities to keep students engaged and assist in the learning process. The curriculum covers four different sessions, which seems to be an appropriate amount of time for the material. This program is worth implementing.

Reviewer 209

This trafficking prevention curriculum is very good and would be a great addition to other sexual violence prevention efforts that are occurring. I would not recommend this curriculum as a standalone - it would likely be most effective if done after or alongside a curriculum that focuses more on consent, sexual violence, and healthy relationships. The first session begins by having the facilitator ask the class to separate into male identifying and nonmale identifying groups. I would advise educators to think critically about how this will work in their classroom, and if there are non-binary or transgender students who may be harmed by this practice. It may also be advisable to do this later in the curriculum after rapport has been built. Finally, while this curriculum is approachable for high school aged students, the subject matter is very specific. Unless they have expertise in Sexual Violence Prevention or Sexual Exploitation and Trafficking, it would likely be best for educators to rely on subject matter experts and local community organizations that have more experience in the topic to facilitate this curriculum. Overall this curriculum is a great option, especially for communities heavily impacted by sex trafficking.
