

You and the Economy

Responsible citizenship requires careful consideration of the roles that people play in local, national, and global economies. You will evaluate the career choices available to you and consider the possible effects of those careers on the local, national, and international economies, as well as on yourself.

Your Task

In a cohesive paper or presentation, you will:

- State a claim in which you declare the career choice that would be best for you.
- Provide reasons for your claim. Include:
 - An analysis of how your career choice will affect the local, national, and/or global economies. Give at least one example.
 - An analysis of how the fluctuations in the economic system may affect your career choice. Give two or more examples.
- Cite specific textual evidence from at least three credible sources that provide relevant information:
 - Cite your sources when you draw information from them: for instance, when you summarize, paraphrase, or quote, and when you refer to facts, figures, and ideas.
 - Provide complete publication information for each source in your bibliography or list of works cited.
